Implementation Science Grant**

About Suicide Prevention Research Fund Implementation Science Grants

In line with the priorities within National Suicide Prevention Strategy and/or the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Suicide Prevention Strategy or a population identified within the strategy, the Implementation Science Grant supports research evidence to move through implementation into practice.

Implementation science is “the scientific study of methods to promote the systematic uptake of research findings and other evidence-based practices into routine practice, and, hence, to improve the quality and effectiveness of health services”¹. Implementation science seeks to systematically close the gap between what we know and what we do by addressing barriers that may halt the uptake of suicide prevention interventions.

These grants support research that aims to improve the understanding of how to design, implement and promote systematic uptake of evidence-based interventions.

The aim of the grant is to fund innovative research to address the implementation gap and progress interventions towards practice.

Who should apply?

The Implementation Science Grant supports researchers at all stages of their career, however there is a requirement that Early- and Mid-Career researchers be included and play a leadership role in the project.

Award value

The total grant value is up to \$500,000 over a period of one to three years.

Selection Criteria

1. Alignment with at least one of the priorities and/or populations identified in the [National Suicide Prevention Strategy 2025-2035](#) and/or the [National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Suicide Prevention Strategy 2025–2035](#) addressing 20%
 - a. The significance of the problem
 - b. The evidence and practice gap
 - c. Implementation of an existing intervention
2. Research rationale, design, methods, key deliverables, analysis plan, timelines, budget and implementation plan 30%
 - a. Describe the research methods, analysis plan and milestones
 - b. How will the project be implemented between 1 and 3 years as appropriate to the project?
 - c. How will the project engage with partner organisations and other service providers to achieve the aims?

Review Panel

The Review Panel consists of experienced researchers, those with lived experience and service provision expertise who assist at various stages of assessment of the grant applications and are appointed through the [Research Advisory Committee](#).

Application Process

Feedback/Appeals Process

The decision of the Board is final and any appeals about the merits of a decision will only be considered in terms of whether due process was followed. Complaints about administrative process must be made in writing, signed by the complainant, and addressed to the Chair, Research Advisory Committee, specifying the nature of and grounds for the complaint.

Funding Requirements

Commencement

The funding commencement date for Implementation Science Grant recipients must occur by 1 January 2027.

Duration

The funding is for a duration between 1 to 3 years.

Applicant requirements

Institutional support

Institutions listed by the Australian Research Council (ARC) and the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) as Administering Institutions are eligible to participate in this scheme.

Applications must be submitted to Suicide Prevention Australia by the due date. Prior to submitting the application the applicant should advise the Administering Institution's Research Grants Office of their intent to apply and ensure that they follow the requirements of the Administering Institution.

Partner Organisation

Applicants for this grant are encouraged to partner with an Organisation for the duration of the research period. High quality applications are those with a clear link with a service provider demonstrating how the implementation will be sustained over time. Details should be provided in the application form.

Researchers working in, or alongside, Organisations are eligible to participate when collaborating with Administering Institutions.

Research(er) eligibility

The research must be conducted in Australia for the benefit of Australians. If the applicant is not an Australian citizen they are required to obtain a legal right to work and reside in Australia prior to the commencement of the research.

In addition:

- Grants must be administered by a recognised Administering Institution which may be based in any State or Territory;
- The team must include a Lead Investigator who is based in a recognised Administering Institution for the duration of the research project;
- The team must include early career researcher/s and/or mid-career researcher/s who are expected to take a supported leadership role.
- Individuals can only be listed as a team member on one grant application in this round of funding;
- Grant applications will only be considered where the research undertaken is primarily related to suicide and its prevention;
- The grant is intended to fund projects that focus on testing the feasibility of existing interventions and/or implementation strategies for projects ready for scale-up or wider uptake in real-world settings.
- We actively encourage applications from people with Lived experience, Lived experience-led research, partnerships with industry, service providers and policy makers

Career Stage

Eligibility Requirements (ERC/MRC Applicants Only)

Applicants must provide the following information at the time of application:

- PhD Conferral Date, applicants must specify the official date of PhD conferral.
- Career Stage, applicants must select one of the following categories:
 - Early Career Researcher (ECR)
 - Mid-Career Researcher (MCR)

Career Disruption

Applicants must indicate whether they have experienced a career disruption outside the standard timeframe. Career disruption may include, but is not limited to, parental or carer leave, caring responsibilities, illness or disability, natural disasters, or other significant personal or professional interruptions. Applicants must specify the relevant time period(s) of the disruption and describe any impact on research productivity, outputs, or career progression.

Incorporating Lived Experience

We encourage applicants to incorporate the perspectives of lived experience of suicide as far as possible, relative to the research and methodology. This will ensure that new knowledge is co-created with lived experience.

Lived experience of suicide includes experiencing suicidal thoughts, surviving a suicide attempt, having self-harmed, having cared for someone through a suicidal crisis, or having been bereaved by suicide. Each lived experience of suicide is a personal life experience and has a unique perspective.

It is intended that applications will demonstrate the inclusion of lived experience and detail how this is achieved across ideation, design, implementation and evaluation of outcomes.

Primary Area of Research

Applicants are required to indicate the primary area which their research will focus upon. The categories have been developed in reference to the World Health Organisation report - - [Preventing suicide: A global imperative, 2014](#)² and Public Health Models.

Curriculum Vitae (CV)

All Curriculum Vitae (CVs) must be submitted at the time of application using the prescribed template.

- The Lead Investigator's CV must be completed and submitted in full using the provided template.
- The Co-Investigator(s)' CV(s) must also be completed and submitted at the time of application using the same template.

References

One written reference for the Lead Investigator must be submitted at the time of application, and may include:

- The current position of the referee
- How the referee knows the Lead Investigator and for how long
- How the Lead Investigator is qualified to work on the research and their contribution
- Personal characteristics and specific skills of the Lead Investigator
- Any additional information the referee believes to be relevant

Ethics approvals

Applicants should be aware of any ethics approvals required for the commencement of their research.

Consent to provide information to International Assessors

In some situations, applications may be provided to overseas assessors for peer review.

In the case under Commonwealth privacy laws, Suicide Prevention Australia will require permission from the applicant to disclose any information contained in the application.

Grant Conditions

Funding agreement

The successful applicant's Administering Institution will be required to enter into a funding agreement with Suicide Prevention Australia.

The funding agreement will be prepared by Suicide Prevention Australia and is not open to negotiation.

Research reporting

Grant recipients will be required to provide Suicide Prevention Australia with progress reports and a final report on the research and the findings, as agreed.

Use of Funds

The total funding request cannot exceed \$500,000 (excl GST).

Funds can be used for costs associated with conducting research and translation activities, including salaries.

Indirect costs, including on costs, are not permissible under this grant.

Communication and Promotion

By submitting an application, consent is being given for contact for (but not limited to) operational feedback, public relations opportunities (such as commentary and interviews) and for inclusion on websites, social media, media releases and mentions in Ministerial announcements.

Communication of the findings of the research through conferences, forums and communication with Suicide Prevention Australia Members will be expected (as appropriate).

Wherever possible, academic journal publications of the research should be on an open access basis.

Availability of recipients for future peer reviewer opportunities

By submitting an application consent is being given to being contacted for future peer review opportunities.

Support from Administering Institution

The application should include a Letter of Support from the researcher's Head of School or Department. There can be only one Administering Institution for the application.

The Letter of Support should include:

1. An understanding of the research, timelines and proposed involvement and support;
2. Endorsement of the Lead Investigator and their proposal;
3. Assessment of the viability of the research proposal;
4. Commitment to providing support to the Lead Investigator and their research.

Involvement of Partner Organisation(s)

The application should include a Letter of Involvement if there will be a partnership with an Organisation(s) for the duration of the research. This should be signed by the Chief Executive Officer or relevant Director of the Organisation.

The Letter of Involvement should include:

1. Support for the research, timelines and proposed involvement;
2. Commitment to providing support to the Lead Investigator and their research;
3. A summary of the Organisation's purpose, strategic goals, activities, organisational structure and key financials.
